2022 Response to Resistance Analysis and Training Summary

Analysis of Defensive Tactics Utilized


There were 317 Response to Resistance Reports in 2022. Generated reports are recorded in the IA Pro software database which obtains its information from data entered by officers in the Blue Team software. As such, the number of specific tactics is higher than the number of incidents as some incidents have more than one offender where officers responded to resistance. Reports prior to 2021 came from software systems that were incident based, therefore the report count was lower than the total number of offenders. Total person taken into custody for 2022 was 13,516 (10,629 adult arrests, 743 juvenile arrests, 2144 Baker Acts).

The number of RTR reports recorded in IA Pro decreased by 7.6% (From 343 to 317) as compared to 2021 data. The number of total RTR tactics however slightly increased by 2% (from 438 to 446). The following table details the number of tactics used by category for 2022 and compared to 2021. Electronic Control Device, Tackles/Takedowns, & Chemical Agents were the most utilized RTR tactics during 2022.








2021 Tactics Used by Percentage





Number of Offenders Involved Per Incident



Analysis of Officer Injuries

Approximately 7% percent of officers involved in response to resistance incidents were injured during a RTR incident (56 of 838 officers). 1% of officers involved (9 total employees) were hospitalized with injuries. These percentages are static with 2021 percentages of officer injuries and hospitalizations.




Analysis of Offender Injuries

Of the 317 Response to Resistance incidents in 2022, an offender sustained an injury in 253 of the incidents. Of these, 87 required hospitalization This is a 10% increase in number of offenders injured compared to 2021, however the total number of RTR incidents decreased by 8% since 2021 (343 to 317).





Analysis by Day of Week, Time, and Sector

The largest volume of response to resistance incidents occurred on Saturdays (27%). The largest volume of response to resistance incidents occurred between the hours of 1900-0300 hours (51%). The Delta sector had 117 incidents (26%), which led all other sectors in the city. The following tables illustrate the number of incidents per day of week and sector.


Response to Resistance Statistics Summary:

There were 317 RTR incidents involving 446 tactics used by officers in 2022. Total persons taken into custody for 2022 was 13,516 (10,629 adult arrests, 743 juvenile arrests, 2144 Baker Acts). Comparatively, total persons taken into custody for 2021 and 2020 were 13,558 & 12,051 respectively (These totals include persons taken into custody for Baker Act). The average response to resistance as a percentage of arrests for the last seven years (2014-2022) has fallen within a range of 2.5 %-3.2%. The percentage for 2022 is 2.05% (280 arrests were made during 317 RTR incidents).


The electronic control device, chemical agent, and take downs have remained the leading tactics/techniques since 2014. The number of officers present when encountering a response to resistance incident has shown a decrease compared to incidents in 2021 trend, which is consistent with the decrease in the number of offenders during response to resistance incidents. Additionally, the department continues to make policy revisions and provide training pertaining to de-escalation.

In 2020, during the on-set of the COVID 19 Pandemic, the number of arrests decreased from 2019. The following chart compares the total number of persons arrested or taken into custody for a Baker Act each year 2020 (pandemic on set year), 2021 (pandemic continued), and 2022 (current year). In the second year of the pandemic (2021), the

number of arrests were greater than both 2020 and the pre-pandemic year of 2019. 2022 arrest numbers slightly decreased from 2021 by less than 1%.



Also compared are the total number of RTR Incidents for each of these three years and total number of offenders involved in these incidents. The RTR Incidents totaled **260** (2020), **343** (2021), and **317** (2022). From those incidents, the total number of offenders involved was **266** (2020), **321** (2021), & **283** (2022). The chart below displays this data.
